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Colossians 2: Torah, Tradition, and Yeshua

Main Topic: Understanding Colossians 2 in Context

- Paul addresses the pressure to conform to conversion processes and traditions for acceptance, drawing a parallel to modern religious institutions (e.g., Catholic Church requirements for conversion).
- True completeness and circumcision come from faith in Yeshua and receiving the Torah on the heart, not ritual circumcision or adherence to extra-biblical traditions.

- Does Paul’s teaching in Colossians 2 mean the Torah is abolished for believers?
- What exactly was “nailed to the cross”—the law itself or the record of sin?
- How should believers today relate to traditions that go beyond or contradict scripture?

Decisions/Clarifications Made:

- The Torah (God’s law) remains relevant and good; what is rejected are man-made traditions and syncretistic practices that nullify the word of God.
- Believers are encouraged to follow the commandments as taught by Yeshua, not the traditions developed by various sects of Judaism or other religions.
- The shadow/substance analogy reinforces that festivals and commandments point to deeper truths found in Messiah but are not rendered obsolete.
