

Summary of New Covenant & Torah in Ezekiel

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Keys of the Kingdom: Covenants Series – Episode 11

Main Topic: Coexistence of the New Covenant and Sinai Covenant

- The episode explores biblical covenants, focusing on the relationship between the New Covenant (initiated through Yeshua/Jesus) and the Sinai Covenant (Torah/law).
- Presenter emphasizes that the Torah (Yahweh's law and instructions) continues to exist alongside the New Covenant, especially during the millennial reign and until the new heavens and new earth.
- The Sinai Covenant is not abolished; its laws and instructions are still relevant for guiding life in God's kingdom.
- The New Covenant is moving towards its fullness, which will be realized after the white throne judgment.

Scriptural Analysis: Ezekiel 34 & 36

- Ezekiel 34 highlights Israel's failed leadership and Yahweh's promise to raise a righteous shepherd (interpreted as Yeshua, the Messiah, in the line of David) to care for the flock.
- The restoration of Israel is described as conditional: the land is Israel's eternal inheritance, but possession depends on adherence to the Torah.
- Ezekiel 36 discusses Israel's defilement of the land, Yahweh's disciplinary scattering, and the promise of regathering and cleansing.
- Emphasis on the symbolic "sprinkling of clean water" as purification and the outpouring of the Holy Spirit, leading to a new heart and spirit for Israel.
- The restoration includes the people of Israel living by Yahweh's statutes (Torah) and a renewed relationship with God.

Key Points & Interpretations

- The coexisting covenants: The Sinai Covenant's laws remain as the foundation for living in God's kingdom; the New Covenant brings the Holy Spirit's empowerment and internal transformation.
- The body of Messiah ("Ecclesia") is within Israel, not a separate "church" entity.
- The restoration of Israel is not yet fully accomplished; biblical prophecies point to a future where Israel is regathered, restored, and walks in obedience.
- Gentile believers are "grafted in" to Israel's covenants but retain their ethnicity; there is no partiality in salvation.
- Yeshua's teachings show how to walk in Torah correctly, making its observance light and fulfilling.

Questions Raised

- How do the covenants coexist, and what does it mean for both to be active?
- What is the correct scriptural interpretation of the "new heart and spirit" promise—does it apply only to Israel, or to Gentiles as well?

Decisions & Action Plans

- Continue the "Covenants Series" with future episodes focusing on passages in Isaiah.
- Encourage listener engagement via comments and subscriptions, aiming for 1,000 subscribers to enable live sessions.
