

Summary of Once Saved Always Saved (OSAS) Debate

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Once Saved Always Saved (OSAS) Discussion

Main Topic: The Doctrine of OSAS

- The host, Tony Pino, introduces the series focused on the doctrine "Once Saved Always Saved" (OSAS), arguing it is a false and dangerous teaching not found in the Hebrew or apostolic scriptures.
- Emphasizes that salvation in Messiah Yeshua (Jesus) is a gift, but receiving it comes with responsibilities. While the gift is freely given, maintaining it requires ongoing faith, repentance, and obedience.
- Tony teaches that faith is a choice and an ongoing act, and that free will allows believers to forfeit their salvation by willful disobedience or breaking the covenant.
- Scriptural references include John 3:16, Ephesians 2:8-10, Galatians 2:20, Galatians 5, 2 Corinthians 7:1, and 1 Thessalonians 5:21-24 to support the view that salvation can be lost through unrepentant sin and rejection of God's commandments.
- Contrasts the "law of Christ" with the laws given at Sinai, stating that the law of Christ includes the commandments and that walking in the Spirit leads to obedience and holiness.
- Refutes the OSAS claim that the believer's spirit cannot be defiled after salvation, using Paul's teaching to argue both flesh and spirit can be defiled and require continual cleansing through repentance.
- Discusses the importance of examining oneself, holding to what is good (Torah/commandments), and abstaining from evil as part of maintaining faith and salvation.

Key Points:

- Salvation is a free gift but comes with covenant responsibilities.
- Faith is an ongoing work and choice—a believer can forfeit salvation by breaking the covenant or persistent sin.
- The law of Christ and the commandments are not opposed; obedience is evidence of genuine faith.
- Both flesh and spirit can be defiled after salvation, necessitating continual repentance and cleansing.
- Scriptural warnings (especially in Galatians and Corinthians) indicate the possibility of forfeiting salvation.

Questions Raised:

- Can salvation be lost or forfeited after receiving it through faith in Yeshua?
- What does it mean to “walk in the Spirit” versus “walk in the flesh”?
- How should the terms “works” and “law” be interpreted in the context of salvation?

Decisions/Positions Stated:

- The host definitively rejects OSAS, stating it is not biblically supported.
- Salvation requires ongoing faith, repentance, and obedience; it is not unconditional, and free will allows a person to walk away from the covenant.

Action Plans:

- Continue the video series to further analyze scriptures related to OSAS.
- Encourage viewers to test themselves, examine their faith, and engage with the teachings via comments and sharing.
