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Keys of the Kingdom: Understanding the Gift of Tongues

1. Context and Introduction

- The meeting is on the eve of Shavuot (Pentecost), the 49th day of counting the Omer, reflecting on the biblical and spiritual significance of this time.
- The speaker aligns with the traditional Jewish calendar and emphasizes unity in the observance of the biblical feasts.
- Purpose: To address confusion around the gift of tongues, its biblical basis, use, and relevance today.

2. Scriptural Foundations: Torah and Acts

Giving of the Torah at Sinai (Exodus 20)

- The giving of the "Ten Words" (Commandments) at Sinai is foundational for understanding spiritual gifts.
- Both Israelites and Gentiles were present, showing the inclusivity of the covenant.
- The concept of "seeing the voices"—possibly hearing God in their own languages—suggests a supernatural event analogous to tongues.
- The Torah was intended as a light to all nations, not just Israel; believers are grafted into Israel's covenants.

Acts 2 and Pentecost

- The outpouring of the Holy Spirit at Shavuot/Pentecost parallels Sinai, with the Holy Spirit enabling believers to speak in other languages.

- The miracle was a public sign for unbelievers: people from many nations heard God's wonders in their native tongues.
- Clarifies that the event likely took place at the Temple, not a private upper room, to fulfill Torah commandments.
- The Acts event resulted in 3,000 conversions, contrasting with 3,000 deaths at Sinai after the golden calf incident.

3. The Gift of Tongues: Biblical Perspective

- Speaking in tongues is considered a powerful, valid, and current gift, but not the sole evidence of the Holy Spirit's indwelling.
- There are many gifts and callings; being filled with the Spirit is not limited to tongues.
- Tongues in Scripture serve primarily as a sign for unbelievers, demonstrating God's power by enabling speakers to witness in languages they don't know.
- Cautions against equating emotional or chaotic manifestations with biblical tongues, especially when lacking interpretation or order.

4. Order, Interpretation, and Correction (1 Corinthians 14)

- Paul addresses misuse of tongues in the Corinthian assembly, providing correction:
 - Tongues have a role in private prayer, where interpretation isn't required.
 - In public assembly, tongues must be interpreted and should be understood by others present.
 - The primary purpose is edification of the assembly and witnessing to unbelievers.
 - If no one can verify or understand the tongue, it brings confusion, not edification.
- Greater emphasis is placed on prophecy, as it directly edifies and exhorts the community.
- The speaker challenges modern practices (e.g., chaotic group tongues, lack of interpretation) as unbiblical and potentially misleading.

Key Points on Order:

- Only two or three should speak in tongues in an assembly, each in turn, with interpretation.
- Prophetic words and interpretations must be subject to discernment and judgment by leadership/elders.
- The Holy Spirit does not bring confusion; true manifestations will be orderly and edifying.

5. Theological Clarifications

- Salvation is by grace through faith, requiring active response: repentance, baptism, and a new life direction.
- Believers are grafted into Israel's covenants; there is no separate "church" apart from Israel (ecclesia = assembly).
- The "death curse" is broken through Yeshua's (Jesus's) resurrection, not by substitutionary punishment but by conquering death.
- Observing the biblical feasts is important for understanding and participating in God's redemptive plan.

Decisions/Conclusions:
